Interview with Mr. Robertson

Hello, Harmony Science. Now that we've jumped head-first into a new school year, that also means new teachers. There are still some familiar faces in the HSA family, but there are also a lot of new ones. There's not much that we know about Mr. Robertson, but in our first interview of the year, we hope to change that.

P: Do you like teaching here?

Mr. Robertson: Yes (emphatically)

P: What made you come here?

R: Well, I was in the process of sending out my resume/interviewing here at Harmony and learning about the school environment and the way that the school is run and conducted, I really enjoyed and was interested in the level of freedom and opportunity that this job would afford me, so I eschewed all of my other offers and now here I am.

P: Are you thinking of staying here?

The PSAT (Preliminary SAT) and SAT are right around the corner. Harmony Science Academy is helping students get prepared by offering free after-school and Saturday tutorials. Mr. Gebes is one of the main teachers that are contributing to helping students get prepared for the PSAT and SAT. When questioned about his motivation for teaching the after-school class, Mr. Gebes replied, "You have to study if you want to pass the SAT and PSAT and you have to solve many, many, many, questions before you can be ready." There will be many SAT Practice test dates coming up. The dates include, September 22nd and October 1st through October 4th. On October 6th will be the first "real" SAT that the 11th graders are taking. If a student scores 217 out of 240, he or she will be eligible to attain a scholarship. Finally, on October 17th, the PSAT will be taken by all high school students and it is mandatory. Good luck!!
